History of Fairview Cemetery

The City of Tipton offers the community a tranquil setting of the Fairview Cemetery as the final resting home for our beloved family and friends.

The first five acres of Fairview Cemetery were platted on June 13, 1881. These five acres were divided into four sections known as blocks 3, 4, 5 and 6. There are now 17 platted sections in the cemetery and two private family triangles.

On December 22, 1899 a corporation was formed to be known as "Fairview Cemetery Company". The company's objective was stated as a burial of human dead.

On June 1, 1954, the "Fairview Cemetery Corporation" was formed.

On January 1, 1983, the City of Tipton assumed ownership of the Fairview Cemetery for the sum of \$1.00.

The cemetery consists of 40 acres, 32 acres which are already developed and 8 acres which can be developed on the north side of the existing cemetery.

Fairview Beautification Program

The City of Tipton Fairview Cemetery Board established the Fairview Cemetery Beautification program through the Tipton County Foundation.

The program was established for the purpose of beautifying the cemetery which includes planting trees, shrubs, flowers and erecting fencing. The donations will be used for the sole purpose of cemetery beautification and improvements as directed by the Cemetery Board.



Fairview Cemetery Rules and Regulations

- All flowers are to be placed on stones or in urns setting on the cement slabs at ends of head stones.
- No flowers, containers or decorations of any kind are to be placed on graves. Please remove any items you want to keep before cleanup in April & September. Grave blankets are permitted from November 1st – April 1st.
- For any change in lot ownership please see cemetery management (superintendent).
- The City of Tipton will not be responsible for any accidents or injuries while on city property.
- All lots and/or graves must be paid in full at the time of deed purchase.
- Additional rules are available in the Cemetery office.
