City of Tipton Common Council meeting was held on September 23, 2024, at Tipton City Hall, Council Chambers, Tipton.

Others: Tom Dolezal, Mike Bollman, Andi Pumphrey, Levi Michalke with American Structurepoint, Jamie Stetzel with American Structurepoint, Chris Tragesser with Etica, Toby Winegar with Etica, Rob Cochrane II, Rob Cochrane III, Bob Edinger, Jenny Frodge, Delora Sullivan-Rich, Kreigh Smith, Elsa Smith, and Joe VanBibber.

Mayor Schmicker opened the September 23, 2024, Council meeting.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Minutes: Councilman Rippy made a motion to approve the September 9, 2024, Council minutes as presented, seconded by Councilman Ehman, with all in favor.

Amend Agenda: Nothing to report.

BOW: Councilman Kring reported on the September 23, 2024, BOW meeting.

Golf Advisory Committee: Councilman Ehman stated there was no meeting.

Solid Waste District Board: Councilman Richards commented they have cleaned up the yard waste and will get the fence line cleaned up.

Street, Alley, & Sidewalk Committee: Councilman Ehman stated they are finishing up with the Sidewalk Program. He also stated there was discussion regarding the speed limit signs. Councilman Ehman commented the walk-through for the CCMG 2023 project was done. He also commented the CCMG 2024 project will start in October. Councilman Ehman stated there was a discussion regarding yard waste containers. He also stated the leaf vac will start running again to pick up leaves.

Planning Commission: Councilman Vautaw commented that they met on September 12, 2024, and passed a couple of Resolutions for EDA Downtown and HP Alloys. He also commented the solar ordinance draft went back to the Committee.

Utility Board: Councilman Rippy stated the September 16, 2024, Utility Board minutes are enclosed. He highlighted a few items from the minutes.

Youth Council: Mayor Schmicker commented there are 16 students, mainly Sophomores and Juniors. He also commented we will probably have this Board to engage with them.

#### New Business:

- Trick or Treat Hours: Councilman Kring made a motion to approve October 30<sup>th</sup> and October 31<sup>st</sup> from 5-8 p.m. for Trick or Treat Hours, seconded by Councilman Ehman, with all in favor.
- Etica Group Public Safety Building Feasibility Study: Mr. Toby Winegar with Etica Group stated we have been working on this from March till May, getting a comprehensive look at the needs of the existing building and what can happen in the future. He reviewed with the Council the enclosed PowerPoint Presentation. Mr. Winegar asked if there were any questions. Councilman Kring thanked them for the brief review. Mayor Schmicker thanked Councilmen Kring and Ehman for being a part of these discussions.
- Structurepoint Engineering Jefferson Street Rebuild: Mr. Jamie Stetzel, Project Manager with American Structurepoint stated this is for Phase 1 of the Jefferson Street Rebuild. He reviewed with the Council the enclosed PowerPoint Presentation. Mr. Stetzel stated this project is federal funding and is 80/20 split with the City responsible for 20 percent. He asked if there were any questions. Councilman Kring stated they are going to do some curb extensions and parking changes this year to get a test run on how it would work.

- Ordinance 2024-11 An Ordinance For Form 4 Adopting The 2025 Budget: Councilman Rippy made a motion to approve Ordinance 2024-11 on first reading, seconded by Councilman Ehman, with all in favor.
- Ordinance 2024-12 An Ordinance Setting Salaries For Elected Officials For The Year 2025 As Required By IC 36-4-7-2: Councilman Richards made a motion to approve Ordinance 2024-12, seconded by Councilman Rippy. Councilman Kring stated the Council's raise is carried to the Utility Board members. Ordinance 2024-12 was passed on first reading with all in favor.
- Ordinance 2024-13 An Ordinance Setting The Maximum Salaries, Wages And Other Compensation For Police Officers, Firefighters And All Other Employees Of The City Of Tipton For The Year 2025: Councilman Rippy made a motion to approve Ordinance 2024-13 on first reading, seconded by Councilman Richards, with all in favor. Councilman Vautaw said thank you to Clerk-Treasurer Clark.
- Claims: Councilman Rippy made a motion to approve claims 177353-177578 for \$740,024.87, seconded by Councilman Vautaw, with all in favor.

#### Petitions, Comments, and Memorials:

- Councilman Vautaw stated he is working with Interim Street Commissioner Clark and Councilman Kring on closing down a portion of Main Street for work being done on the Courthouse. Mayor Schmicker stated to make sure and communicate with the School Corporation.
- Mr. Rob Cochrane III, Market Road, Tipton commented he was a Board member of Tipton Main Street and extended his appreciation with the help of their current projects such as Food Truck Friday, the flowerpots, and hometown banners. He also commented they have a new event, the Halloween Bash on Saturday, October 12<sup>th</sup> from 6-9 p.m. with Mad Tap. This is for 21 and older. Mr. Cochrane stated their biggest event is Tis The Season. He also congratulated the Council on the DORA Ordinance. Mr. Cochrane asked some questions regarding DORA and stated they would love to continue the partnership with the City.
- Mr. Rob Cochrane II, Market Road, Tipton stated he is a School Board Representative for Cicero Township. He also stated there are issues the community is facing and we need your help. There is a decline in students, and we need a housing initiative. We would like to see the partnership with the City and School, and we want to see the community flourish. Councilman Richards asked when the next School Board meeting was. Mr. Cochrane stated September 24<sup>th</sup> for the budget and then October 12<sup>th</sup>. There was a brief discussion regarding housing and TIF's.

Adjournment: Councilman Richard made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Councilman Vautaw.

Ms. Delora Sullivan-Rich commented she would like something done with the trash/recycle bins being left on the sidewalks. It was stated there are some ADA concerns and marketing concerns. Something is supposed to be done with them. Councilman Kring stated we have an Ordinance. He also stated Councilman Richards and himself have a meeting tomorrow and we will look and see if there are any fines. Ms. Sullivan-Rich addressed her concerns about the road bumpouts and the slanted parking. She stated this is very dangerous and she is very much against it.







First Floor Plan








Second Floor Plan








### TYPICAL CROSS SECTIONS - DOWNTOWN


